### "Build a Better World" a Success at Local Libraries

Local libraries filled with children and adults during this past July for Summer Reading Club, all enjoying a number of programs related to the theme "Build a Better World." After the special kick-off performances by Bright Star Touring Theatre – "Happily Ever After" at the Oakland Library and "Upcycled Cinderella" at the Grantsville Library - weekly programs began at each library branch. Participants created terrariums from empty soda bottles, learned about flowers that attract pollinators, and built birdhouses. They exercised to build a stronger body, created craft items from recycled materials, and were introduced to the basics of electricity and building sturdy foundations. Participants experienced how to build a better world through song, in Grantsville they painted rocks and then hid them throughout the community for passersby to enjoy, and in Friendsville they learned about identifying world coins.

The presenters for these programs included Garrett County Recycling Coordinator Kim Madigan, "Ronald McDonald," professional engineer Jesse Burow, master electrician Mike Stemple, Debbie Carpenter from Jazzercise Garrett County, Bob and Jennifer Pletta, musician Pat Shelton, University of Maryland Extension Office with Garrett County Master Gardeners in training, members of the Mountain Laurel Garden Club, and artist Regina Holliday.

The attendance for the Ruth Enlow Library system as a whole totaled 461 children and 252 adults. Children tracked the books they read during Summer Reading Club in a reading log, and this year the total reached 2117 books. Completed reading logs were entered into a drawing


